
The Valley During World War II

Join us to learn how the local towns worked diligently in the war effort. Included are the fashions of the era, favorite films, rationing measures, war bond drives, and much more.

ANDREW'S PICKS

Leaves of Grass (Tim Blake Nelson, 2009).

This is a movie in which one character performs a striptease while reciting *Catullus*, and another recites Walt Whitman while gutting a catfish. It's something of a miracle that a script so self-consciously steeped in literary allusions, not to mention genuine philosophical questioning, doesn't have an ounce of pretentiousness in it. It puts me in mind of the Coen brothers — hardly surprising, since *Leaves of Grass* is written and directed by their friend and collaborator Tim Blake Nelson, one of the greatest character actors of our time. A Jewish Oklahoman who majored in Classics at Brown and studied with the philosopher Martha Nussbaum before beginning his acting career, Nelson manages to satirize both academia and the heartland with a voice



that is simultaneously irreverent and profound. Ed Norton stars in a dual role as the Kincaid twins: Bill, a Classics professor at Brown, and Brady, a small-time drug dealer in Oklahoma. The film also stars Nelson as Brady's partner-in-crime, alongside Susan Sarandon, Melanie Lynskey, pre-Americans Keri Russell, post-Mad Men Maggie Siff, a gloriously unhinged Josh Pais, and the great Richard Dreyfuss in a show-stealing role as a Jewish druglord named Pug Rothbaum who operates out of "Maccabee Pipe & Supply" and donates his ill-gotten millions to the state of Israel. Like the Coens, Nelson unflinchingly portrays the violence and stupidity of humanity but also allows his characters moments of grace and something like wisdom. Brady Kincaid, knowing that no truly parallel lines can exist in nature, sees in Euclid's geometry the shadow of a higher and more perfect world: "Man can't create true parallel. It's just more of a concept . . . Well, that concept, that perfection, we know it exists and we think about it, but we can't ever get there ourselves. I think that right there is God." Plato couldn't have said it any better.




Afternoon TeaV
